

Information Literacy Plan for Milligan College, Tennessee
Growing out of The Council of Independent College’s “The Transformation of the College Library Workshop,” Cleveland, OH, April 12-14, 2007

The Context: Mission Statement: “As a Christian liberal arts college, Milligan College seeks to honor God by educating men and women to be servant-leaders.” Milligan College is an undergraduate liberal arts college with a highly structured curriculum. We want to help students learn to learn, and to acquire a commitment for life-long learning.

General perceptions of our current situation:

1) Students are tech- and Internet-savvy. However, this creates an over-confidence that they also know how to find and effectively use needed relevant information. They do not adequately know about the print, electronic, and Internet-based information resources the Library has to offer.

2) Faculty are not fully aware of the information resources the Library has to offer, especially electronic resources. Faculty may not know how to access and navigate these electronic resources.

3) Faculty fear that information literacy instruction will cut into their teaching time (i.e., content delivery).

4) First- and second-year curriculum does not adequately introduce/reinforce information literacy skills. Students may focus on completing the formal requirements of assignments regarding information resources—“The professor says I need one book, one journal article and one reliable website.”—without thinking about how these resources assist the research process.

5) Librarian skill-sets may need upgrading to fully engage a plan for information literacy.

The Plan:

Measuring Outcomes:

- 1) Compare quality of research and writing assignments year by year
- 2) Conduct exit interviews by major
- 3) Evaluate NSSE data
